Mike went to sleep after suffering a brain aneurysm, and his passing generated shockwaves among not only his broadcasting family but other students with whom he attended classes.

In eulogizing him during the home-going service some of his broadcasting classmates expressed their shock at his passing, but found solace recalling in his gentleness, warm personality and the genuine friendship they all shared with him. They feel that his absence in the Broadcasting Department leaves a monumental void, but a legacy of ‘strength in hope’...the same hope Mike had in graduating with his degree and pursuing a career encompassing work in Television, Radio and Marketing. The irony was that he died a couple days before he was scheduled to commence employment in the industry.

In paying tribute during the memorial service, Chair of the Broadcasting Department Dr. Lewis described “Big Mike” as “the quintessential student... easy to teach, easy to get along with and a hard worker.” He said everyone who knew Mike appreciated his humility, tender spirit and his passionate disposition...the warmth of his smile and his captivating personality.

In observance of his passing, City College has decided to award his degree posthumously and also to make a contribution to the Foundation chosen his relatives. May his soul rest in peace! ●

Career Online High School at City College Hollywood

On any given afternoon this summer, students, faculty and staff at City College's Hollywood campus have been treated to a new sight: high school-aged students bent studiously over notebooks and computers at the College's computer lab.

These high school students are completing career-focused coursework towards a high school diploma using **Smart Horizon's Career Online High School** program. Normally, the online high school program—which has the rare distinction of being accredited by **AdvancedED Accreditation Commission**—is completed online, in the comfort of the student's home. According to Hollywood campus's Executive Director **David Higley**, the school contracted Smart Horizon to have students complete some of their coursework at City College Hollywood.

The students are supervised and aided while on campus by English/Gen Ed instructor **Jennifer Mann**. Mann says, "The program is particularly unique because it allows students access to our campus resources and places them in an academic environment, which may not be fostered online. By coming here, high school students witness our City College students pursuing their career goals. Our high school students in turn become more focused on their own career goals."

A Duke University grad, Jennifer Mann is enjoying the new opportunity to work with students in a non-instructional manner where she is helping to students, and potential City College students, attain their goals. ●

Faculty Spotlight

New Director, New Cardiovascular Sonography Program at City College

City College would like to extend a warm welcome to **Mark Berges**, the new Director of the Cardiovascular Program. With 11 years experience in the field as a Cardiac and Vascular Sonographer, Berges is helping City College Hollywood inaugurate the new program in the Fall of 2013. According to Berges, the program at City College will have the unique distinction of training students to work with both the cardiac and vascular systems. Currently, most schools have separate cardiac and vascular programs. "For a student to complete both programs separately, it would take five years," says Berges.

The Cardiovascular Sonography program at City College will be a two year program that can be completed in eight quarters. It will also require students to complete a 900-hour externship in the field. Berges and City College are currently working on partnering to aid students in completing this comprehensive requirement.

When the first batch of 10-12 students begin this Fall semester, City College Hollywood plans to have four ultrasound machines and a cardiovascular lab. The program will maintain a cap of 12 new students per term and per class to maintain a small instructor-student ratio as students complete core courses such as EKG and Ultrasound Physics, in addition to the current general education courses.

Mark Berges has a BA in Health Science, is a Registered Cardiac Sonographer, a Certified Cardiovascular Technician, a Registered Certified Electronic Health Record Specialist and is a member of several professional associations, including the **American College of Cardiology** and the **American Heart Association**. With so much experience in the field, why the shift into the field of education? Berges was asked to work as an externship coordinator at two different schools and then had the opportunity to teach. And the rest, asserts Berges was "destiny." ●

While serving a tour of duty in Ar Ramadi, Iraq, Mondesir tells of a wounded woman arriving at his Forward Operating Base, with her seven-year-old son at her side holding her hand. "At first glance, we didn't know what to make of it as she was covered in so much blood we weren't sure if it was her or where it came from. Upon further investigation, we discovered that her wounds were very serious. She was basically being held together by shrapnel. Any movement or attempt to remove said shrapnel would have resulted in death by blood loss.

"... I decided saving lives was something I could do for the rest of my life."

After that, we decided it would be best to not let this kid watch his mom die at six or seven years old, so another Marine and I took him to get some food which was when we noticed his wound. Before we could get him out of the medical ward it became clear that the blood on his shoe was his own. He had taken some shrapnel in his leg near the femoral artery so we had to act quickly. The other Marine kept him talking while I cut his pant leg open and removed the metal using the only tool I had on me: a pocket knife. I got the metal out and dressed the wound because the Navy doctors had their hands full already and then took him to see a Corpsman for advanced care. That was when I decided saving lives would be something I could do for the rest of my life."

Already a leader and mentor at City College, having attained Outstanding Academic Achievement (GPA 3.5-3.69) in his first semester at Hollywood, Curtis Mondesir seems well on his way to achieving that goal. ●
